Main research questions

- What attracts international students to Turku?
- How are the international students integrating into Turku and what could be done to help their integration process?
 Integration is analysed by social relations, language skills and employment.
- What do international students plan to do after their graduation?

Survey

- sent to 1,717 international degree students studying at Åbo Akademi University, the University of Turku, Turku University of Applied Sciences and Novia University of Applied Sciences Turku campus in September 2015
- 303 respondents (response rate 18%)
 - ÅAU 13% UTU 19% TUAS 19% Novia 18%

Suggested improvements for HEIs

"The level of Finnish language courses is too low. There should be a course to prepare for the B1 exam." (North America, UTU)

"Make Finnish courses faster in tempo. And don't make it compulsory for short term exchange students. A lot of them do not want and do not learn it anyway and just slow down those who want to learn Finnish." (Other Europe, UTU)

Suggested improvements for HEIs

• "More help to know the Finnish university culture (...) by which I mean students are supposed to respect other, but also be more independent, do not compare or compete with others, just work hard and focus on their own things, and know how to communicate with their teachers and supervisors." (China, UTU)

Reasons to leave Turku

"I'm unsure if any company wants to employ me, a foreigner, full-time in Turku. Moreover, the new, xenophobic climate in Finland scares me." (EU/EEA)

"From what I understand of Turku, and Finland as a whole, this is not a good place to seek employment. Jobs are scarce, and the salaries are not very competitive, which combined with Finland's rather weak economy as a whole is not very enticing." (Sweden) "Everyone keeps talking about lack of jobs and poor economical situation, quite pessimistic I would say. I believe anywhere can be a place to work with the right business mindset and driven entrepreneurship." (Finland)
